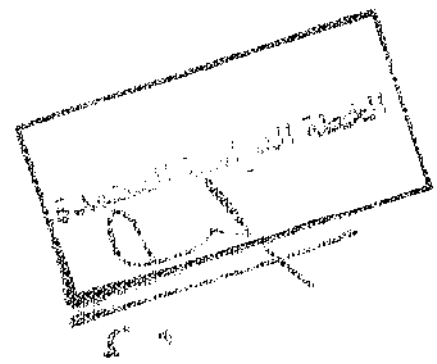

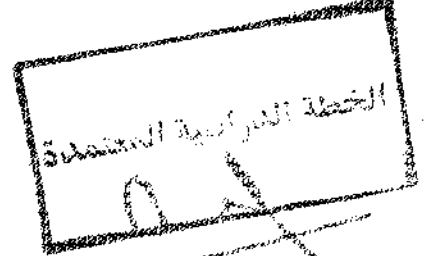

## Courses Description



### **(3001701) Theories of International Relations**

**(3cr)**

This Course Focuses on Different Perspectives of International Relations such as Liberalism and Neo-liberalism, Realism and Neo-realism, International Society Theory, Postmodernism, International Critical Theory, Feminism and Green Politics. Moreover, it Provides Students with a Solid Ground in International Relations and its Different Aspects.

### **(3001702) Foreign Policy**

**(3cr)**

This course introduces the theories of " Foreign Policy and its Analyzation" to empower students through acquainting them with the international foreign policy. This course deals with the foreign policy makers, foreign policy tools.

### **(3001725) Peace Building**

**(3cr)**

This course explores and analyzes the theoretical and practical foundations of various approaches to working with post-conflict situation so to achieve positive goals like social equity and reconciliation in order to transcend conflict' consequences such as complex issues of trauma, abuse, historical injustice and violence. Moreover, attention will be given to a range of methods and practices such as reconciliation, UN peacekeeping operations, principles of restorative justice and dynamics of collective peace building practice.

### **(3001704) Public International Law**

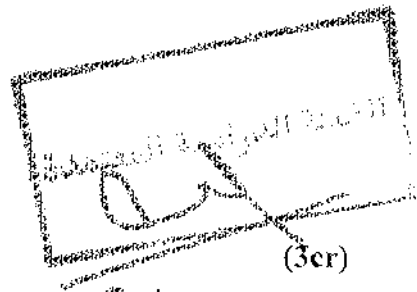
**(3cr)**

This course deals with the general concept of International Law, its nature, resources, its relations with the domestic law, its actors, the states and international responsibility.

### **(3001705) Diplomacy (1)**

**(3cr)**

This course focuses on diplomacy in terms of its evolution, conceptual theories and practices. Moreover, it presents a definition of diplomatic law in terms of resources, ethics and overview of the international agreements that control diplomatic interaction. Furthermore, the course focuses on the state's institutions concurred by central and external diplomacy and its legal position beyond state's border.



**(3001706) Diplomacy (2)**

**(3cr)**

This course offers students to develop certain diplomatic skills and study international diplomatic agreements like Diplomatic law, Vienna Conventions of 1961 and 1963. Moreover, it offers a study to the basics of protocol and fundamentals of the diplomatic language.

**(3001726) Culture, Religion and Conflict**

**(3cr)**

This course focuses on culture, religion and conflict by exploring the role culture and religion plays in conflict and how they impact its resolution. This course treats culture and religion as aspects of individual and group identity which influence the causes, dynamics, outcomes of conflicts, and intervention methods. It identifies core patterns of cultural differences such as values and beliefs, patterns of thought, interpretive frames, and behavior in conflict management efforts.

**(3001710) Strategic and Security Studies**

**(3cr)**

This course focuses on the different concepts of strategy, security and their developments particularly after the Cold War. It also focuses on concepts related to domestic, regional as well as international level and their relative view of concepts related to great, middle and small states.

**(3001720) Theories of Conflict**

**(3cr)**

This course would allow students to develop an advance understanding to different social and scientific theoretical perspectives that offer analyses and interpretation to conflict as a social phenomenon through focusing on its definition, concept, sources and stages. Moreover, this course would also enable students to develop necessary research and analytical skills.

**(3001721) Negotiation**

This course is especially designed to allow students to explore, gain and develop an in-depth understanding of different theoretical perspectives on negotiation process including its definition, concept, strategies, conditions and key characteristics of negotiation process. Moreover, this course would also enable the students to develop necessary research and analytical skills.

**(3001727) Method of Third Party Intervention (3cr)**

This course is especially designed to allow students to explore, develop and gain an in-depth understanding of different techniques of conflict management and resolution such as mediation, arbitration, good office, conciliation and preventive diplomacy. Moreover, this course would also enable students to develop necessary research and analytical skills.

**(3001723) International Conflicts (Simulation) (3cr)**

This course is designed to allow students to explore and analyses in depth different and selected international conflicts through applying relevant conflict analysis approaches. Moreover, this course aims at developing students' research and analysis skills to enable them to carry out independent research as well as the ability to apply what the students have learned on the analysis of those conflicts and their different aspects.

**(3001724) Jordan and International Conflict Management (3cr)**

This course is designed to allow students to explore and analyses an advanced understanding to Jordan's regional as well as international role in the management of international conflicts particularly its participation in international peace keeping operations.

**(3002701) Research Methods in International Studies (3cr)**

This is an advanced course in methodological, theoretical and technical issues in international studies. The course focuses on philosophy of social sciences and research ethics, comparative methods in international studies, and on combining qualitative and quantitative methods. Students will study research design, techniques of data collection, sampling and measurement, report and proposal writings, statistical analysis with computer application game theory.
